The Mission of the Hardin County Business Advisory Council is to create partnerships between Hardin County businesses, Hardin County/City schools, and the educational service center that will enhance communication between the business and educational community. The partnership will augment educational opportunities for students in the community by providing information, instruction, and training that will help to establish and sustain a talented workforce in Hardin County.

The purpose of the Hardin County Business Advisory Council is to:

- To foster cooperation among schools, businesses, and the communities they serve
- To ensure that the work of educators aligns with the needs of businesses
- To enhance awareness of the labor market, promote work-based experiences within businesses and help students prepare for successful learning and employment opportunities

The role of the Hardin County Business Advisory Council is to:

- To advise local school districts on changes in the economy and job market and the area in which future jobs are most likely to be available
- To advocate for the employment skills most critical to business and industry and the development of curriculum to teach these skills
- To aid and support local school districts by offering suggestions for developing a working relationship among businesses, labor organizations, and educators

The general goals of the Hardin County Business Advisory Council are:

- To collaboratively determine and delineate needed employment skills
- To collaboratively develop curriculum necessary to instill those skills in Hardin County students
- To advise local boards of education on the economy, the job market, and the types of employment in which future jobs are most likely to be available
- To nurture relationships and enhance communication among business, labor, and education personnel

- 3. Connect: How do we better facilitate connections between local employers and students who plan to enter the workforce upon graduation?

4. Honor: How do we do a better job of marketing workforce careers and honoring those students who choose to serve their community as part of the local workforce?
